Teacher!

"She (Mary) turned and said to him (Jesus) in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher).

— John 20:16 NRSV

She was grieving. Mary had witnessed the crucifixion and death of her friend and mentor just three days earlier. It was an agonizing and humiliating death she saw Jesus experience. Now, as was custom, she went to the tomb to prepare Jesus' body for a more permanent burial. This was difficult enough, but when they arrived at the tomb, the body was nowhere to be found.

Mary's grief clouded her memory of Jesus' prophesy that he would rise from the dead. As more tears cascaded down her cheeks, she asked a person she thought to be the caretaker of the tomb where they had taken Jesus' body so she could care for it. Then something unexpected happened. The caretaker called her by name! And his voice sounded so familiar! Could it be? Could it be Jesus?

It never ceases to amaze me that in my travels all over the United States that no matter where I travel, I will run into someone I know. I may not have seen them in years, but either I recognize them, or they see me and it's like old home week. I am comfortable talking with people I know. We share a kindred spirit. But meeting strangers...that is outside my comfort zone. I tend to shy away from strangers. After all, as children we were taught not to talk to strangers.

But the perceived caretaker of Jesus' tomb seemed to be a stranger to Mary. It was only after she asked where they had taken Jesus that she realized that she was talking with the Savior himself. In Matthew 25 we are told that if we help anyone in need we are helping Jesus. The truth is we all stand in need of God's grace. It is easy to help those we know. We sit with people we know in church or fellowship time, but how often do we move outside our comfort zone to sit with someone we don't know or participate in a new mission experience where we will meet new people. When was the last time we invited someone to church or maybe even to join us for a meal at a nearby restaurant or even our home? When we do God will bless us with unexpected blessings!



EUMC HISTORY CORNER

We left off in March with 1964 and will begin this month with 1965.

In February of 1965, the MYF were making plans for the showing of Billy Graham movies which were open to the public. During 1965, Mrs. Pott's Committee met and identified the need for a ramp to be built at the north door in September of 1965. Mrs. Potts also urged everyone to continue writing letters to stop the advertising of alcohol and tobacco on television. A discussion was held about whether we should continue phone service with the rising costs but the decision was made to continue the service.

1966 saw the remodel of the sanctuary. A new pulpit was donated by the Sharpe family. Altar chairs were donated by the Edwards family. New padded pews were installed, In memory of the Goebels, new choir chairs, robes and collars were purchased along with a new communion service. The walls were painted and the colored glass in the windows was restored as needed. On November 23, 1966 our church participated in a city-wide Thanksgiving Service at the high school. The Presbyterian minister gave the message and our church provided two ushers.

Our church's Hospitality Committee sent 7 bags to boys in Vietnam for a cost of \$3.50 to \$4.00 per bag, including postage. In June of 1967, George Harshbarger reported on an air conditioning survey. 13 were in favor and 11 opposed. A pledge was received for \$745. In 1967, the pastors salary was \$5,000 and the entire church budget was \$11,040.

In 1968 a need was identified to have a more reverent atmosphere to prevail in the sanctuary prior to the morning service. Quiet was to prevail as soon as the organ prelude started in an effort to promote and encourage a spirit of prayer proceeding church service. A kitchen stove was installed and paid for by the Methodist Men in the amount of \$75.86. On April 13, 1968, the United Methodist Church was officially created when Bishop H. Mueller, representing the Evangelical United Brethren Church, and Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke of the Methodist Church joined hands at the constituting General Conference in Dallas, Texas. The church had approximately 11 billion members, making it one of the largest Protestant churches in the world. The cross and flame were adopted to symbolize the new church.

A new furnace and AC was installed and the basement was redecorated during the late 1960's, early 1970's.

In early 1969, Leone Potts, a lifelong member died, leaving a sizeable Trust Fund to the Eureka United Methodist Church. Her appointed trustees were attorney Ben Leiken, Burrus Dickinson and Byron Colburn. The church was to receive \$3,000 yearly plus interest. The principle could be used as needed with the exception for the use in building a new church building. Otherwise, there were no stipulations on the use of the money. Also in 1969, the weekly church new bulletin began during the month of October, 1969 following a motion by Charles Hinnen during an administrative board meeting. All information was to be first cleared through Reverend Flynn before dissemination.

1970 saw the retirement of Reverend Leroy P. Flynn after 17 years. He had been the pastor of the Eureka church since 1953. As original occupants, he and his wife had been living in the church's first parsonage, located at 410 N. Main Street. The parsonage was sold to the Flynn's for \$8,500. Reverend Raymond Bjork followed Reverend Flynn as our pastor. In January of 1970 a motion was made to allow young boys to light the worship candles. This met with lively discussion and the motion passed 6 to 3 so long as the boys remained under the direct supervision of the worship chairperson.

In August of 1971, Beth Spence (Brush), representing the MYF, challenged the Methodist Men to a softball game. As predicted, the men won. The MYF also expressed a desire to perform a service project for the church. Suggestions included: maintenance of the old Cruger Methodist Cemetery located near the golf course; the upkeep of the church yard; and assisting some of our church's older members with minor upkeep and remodeling jobs.

On February 1972, Reverend Bjork first used an overhead projector to present the previous month's minutes of the Administrative Board. In May of 1972, the first official softball team began. June 1972, the Women's Society of Christian Service, whose leader was Rosie Hinnen, officially became The United Methodist Women. Also in June of 1972, Pastor Bjork expressed appreciation for the cleaning of the old Cruger Methodist Cemetery by Randy Tennis and reported that Tim Lanier will maintain the cemetery over the summer. The names were copied off the tombstones and placed in the safe deposit box. December saw the Christmas Basket Committee distribute 17 fruit plates to home-bound members. Then Vietnam came to a close following the Paris Peace Accords.

Next month we will take up in 1974.


