Teacher!

"She (Mary) turned and said to him (Jesus) in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). – John 20:16 NRSV

She was grieving. Mary had witnessed the crucifixion and death of her friend and mentor just three days earlier. It was an agonizing and humiliating death she saw Jesus experience. Now, as was custom, she went to the tomb to prepare Jesus' body for a more permanent burial. This was difficult enough, but when they arrived at the tomb, the body was nowhere to be found.

Mary's grief clouded her memory of Jesus' prophesy that he would rise from the dead. As more tears cascaded down her cheeks, she asked a person she thought to be the caretaker of the tomb where they had taken Jesus' body so she could care for it. Then something unexpected happened. The caretaker called her by name! And his voice sounded so familiar! Could it be? Could it be Jesus?

It never ceases to amaze me that in my travels all over the United States that no matter where I travel, I will run into someone I know. I may not have seen them in years, but either I recognize them, or they see me and it's like old home week. I am comfortable talking with people I know. We share a kindred spirit. But meeting strangers...that is outside my comfort zone. I tend to shy away from strangers. After all, as children we were taught not to talk to strangers.

But the perceived caretaker of Jesus' tomb seemed to be a stranger to Mary. It was only after she asked where they had taken Jesus that she realized that she was talking with the Savior himself. In Matthew 25 we are told that if we help anyone in need we are helping Jesus. The truth is we all stand in need of God's grace. It is easy to help those we know. We sit with people we know in church or fellowship time, but how often do we move outside our comfort zone to sit with someone we don't know or participate in a new mission experience where we will meet new people. When was the last time we invited someone to church or maybe even to join us for a meal at a nearby restaurant or even home? When we do God will bless us with unexpected blessings!

The used wheelchairs were then trucked to a prison in Missouri where they were rebuilt and gifted to people with mobility issues in 24 countries. We begin March 2024 with 1959

1959 was our 76th year in our current building which was built in 1883. Sometime in 1959, there was remodeling of the "front" of the building which faced Court Street. This remodel included a new front and entrance with concrete steps and glass doors. The vestibule was enlarged, the bell tower replaced by a cross. A new stairway and rooms were added to the basement.

Also in October of 1959, the board reported we had permission to convert to city gas, with notification to the city within 10 days. It would end up costing \$185 to convert. Trustee Mr. Baker made the notification to the city and Charles Hinnen made a motion to inquire into the cost of having a telephone installed in the building. After the gas installation, the church purchased and installed a gas conversion furnace.

In January of 1960, permission was given to the Sunday School board to convert the old basement coal room into a classroom for Sunday School use.

Mr. Golden reported in February of 1960 that the new addition to the building had all been completed except for an outside light. These improvements include the removal of the old steeple and bell on the southeast corner of the church, the addition of what now is referred to as the south porch, and enlargement of the basement. The improvements totaled \$5,179.19. Plans were made to retain the bell and have it mounted somewhere on the church property. It presently sits on the east side of our church.

During January 1961 official board meeting, Chairman Charles Hinnen announced he wished to go on record as opposing the petition now circulating for the City of Eureka to make available liquor licenses.

The official board met in May of 1971 and Mr. Hacker brought up the notion of installing sanitary drinking facilities within the church. Charley Kenney was appointed to see this was taken care of. By June, a water fountain was attached to the water faucet in the basement at no charge.

December 1961 saw church members save four cent stamps and those of greater value to be used in the purchase of milk for overseas relief. Additionally, members were urged to write letters to television stations concerning liquor advertising on their TV channels.

In 1962 the bell from the bell tower was mounted in the church yard. Also, in July of 1962, plans were being made to remodel the basement kitchen.

1963 saw the completion of the basement kitchen remodel. The south side of the building was reroofed and new carpet was donated and installed in the vestibule.

On April 4, 1973, Leone Potts reported to the W.S.C.S. on behalf of the Christian Social Concerns and Christian Social Relations that our church's conference had taken up the initial work of the women opposing liquor on radio and TV. In support of this, our church was given the responsibility of writing 50 letters on the subject. In addition, the women's group wrote a letter to Governor Kerner opposing horse betting at the state fair.

An entry in the Women's Society of Christian Service November minutes reported, "Talking before church services on Sunday morning was discussed and all agreed to be more quiet."

During this entire period, Rev. Leroy Flynn was the Pastor. He served from 1953-1970, a total of 17 years.

In April, we will begin with 1965.
